

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In 2012, Chancellor Hank Huckaby recommended a semistitutional consolidations within the University System of Georgia, including the meroder of the Georgia College & State University and Gainesville State College, to become the Universitor of Georgia. In an effort to build institutional unity post-consolidation and further establish UNG as an engaged institution, the 2014-2015 Academic Year was declared the Year of Engagement.
